

The auxiliary do/does

The auxiliary do is the auxiliary used to form the **negative** and **interrogative** forms in the **simple present tense**. It is conjugated in the same way as other verbs :

Affirmative

- o I do
- o You do
- o He / She / It does
- o We do
- o You do
- o They do

Negative

- o I do not
- o You do not
- He / She / It does not
- o We do not
- o You do not
- They do not

The **negative form** is usually contracted to **don't** and **doesn't**.

Interrogative

- o Do 1?
- o Do you?
- O Does he / she / it?
- o Do we?
- o Do you?
- o Do they?

When used in an **interrogative** or **negative** sentence, the verb **following** the auxiliary **do** takes its **infinitive form**.





Examples:

- She goes to work by car.
- She doesn't go to work by train.
- Does she go to work on foot?
- He plays football every weekend.
- He doesn't play football during the week.
- Does he play in a good team?
