

Simple future with will

1. Affirmative form

Will + infinitive is used to express the *simple future*. This tense speaks of actions in the future which are either *certain* or are *intended* or are reliant upon a *condition*.

- Certainty: I will be in bed at midnight.
- Intention : She will finish her homework later.
- Condition: We will eat in the garden if it doesn't rain.

The future auxiliary will is the same for all persons and the main verb is always an infinitive.

Note: The auxiliary will can be contracted to 'II.

- I will do it // I'll do it
- You will do it // you'll do it
- He / she / it will do it // he / she / it'll do it
- We will do it // we'll do it
- You will do it // you'll do it
- They will do it // they'll do it

2. Negative and interrogative forms

These are the same as with other structures. It is the auxiliary which takes the negative form using **not** or which is **inverted** to form the interrogative structure.

Negative: The contracted form of will not is won't.

- We won't know until tomorrow.
- I won't have time to see you today.

Interrogative

- Will you help me with this exercise? Yes, I will. / No, I won't.
- What will happen if I press this button?

Won't is also used to indicate that something or someone refuses to do something.

- My car won't start.
- The baby won't eat.
- Your dog won't listen to me.





3. Using shall

Shall is often used to replace *will* on the first persons singular and plural and is followed by an *infinitive*. **Shall** is only used with I and we.

- I shall be a little late this evening.
- We shall have to prepare the spare room before they arrive.

This in no way changes the meaning and, in the examples given above, *will* can also be used. However, **shall** is used to make a *suggestion* or to ask for another person's opinion.

- Shall we go out this evening?
- Shall I call an ambulance?
- Shall I stop now? > This asks the other person if they think I should stop.
- Will you stop now? > This **tells** the other person that you want **them** to stop.
